## The remarkable surgery that saved Mother and Baby

Tracy, bowel cancer patient, wrote to us about her recent fundraising: "without the expertise of surgeons from the Pelican Cancer Foundation and the North Hampshire Hospital. Basingstoke, my life would have been very different. They were the only ones who rose to the challenge of operating when I found out I had bowel cancer at 18 weeks pregnant, allowing me to survive the disease and also give birth to a healthy son.

Pelican is local to where I live in Hampshire but it has an impact far and wide. If you know anyone who has

been affected by bowel cancer, it is likely that wherever they live. they will have benefited from the work of the Pelican Cancer Foundation as the home of the 'gold standard' in bowel cancer surgery. Everyone who took care of me during that time was amaz-

I turned 40 at the end of 2013 and I really wanted to challenge myself and for those of you who know my fitness level, you know it was going to be a challenge. The motivation of fundraising for a

charity that means so much to me spurred me on".

And I did it! (The Grand Union Challenge). My time was a little disappointing 6h 40m, partly because we got a little distracted by the wildlife and amazing scenery for the first half. I walked with my friend Helena (pictured right). We laughed a lot along the way, especially when one of the marshals asked if cancer was a common illness in pelicans!"

#### Medical Research...

### "When we invest in medical research we

win twice over..." Dr Jeremy Farrar, Director of the Wellcome Trust

There is a strong 'ripple' effect to our work and every bowel cancer patient will have benefited from the progress in treatment enabled by our research and shared clinical practice, often without realising



Bill Clinton recently said his greatest achievement in office was spending \$3Bn on the human genome project - for the massive contribution to medicine and because it has generated a whole new industry and area of economic growth.

A recently published report has calculated the economic benefit of medical research as 40p for every £ invested every year. This is 10p for direct health benefits and a further 30p for the 'spillover'. Dr Jeremy Farrar, Director of the

Wellcome Trust, said: "When we invest in medical research, we win twice over: we make discoveries that lead to better health, while also generating wealth".

#### **RESEARCH GRANTS 2014**

Every year Pelican looks for new research projects to support. We advertise nationally for studies that advance precision surgery. All the applications received are reviewed and many are sent out for peer review. This year the studies below were awarded grants:

#### SERENADE (Royal Marsden Hospital) £10,000

Half of all patients diagnosed with colorectal cancer have a risk of liver metastases (cancer that has spread to the liver) at the time of diagnosis. This study will test whether an MRI scan at diagnosis could identify more liver metastases at this stage than the current practice which is a CT scan. The aim is to improve the intensity and effectiveness of treatment.

#### TRACHTOMAP (Hammersmith Hospital, Imperial College London) £20.000

Nerve damage, leading to erectile problems and incontinence, are significant side effects of prostate cancer surgery. This study will use a new MRI technique - diffusor tensor imaging, to map the nerves around the prostate, predicting whether they are likely to be damaged during surgery. The aim is to help patients and surgeons decide the most suitable treatment to avoid nerve damage.

### TRIGGER (Basingstoke and Royal Marsden) £18.000

Almost half of patients with rectal cancer are offered chemoradiotherapy before surgery. However there is great variability in how tumours respond to this treatment. This study uses MRI scans in a 'smarter' way, using the MRI Tumour Regression Grade ('mrTRG'), to identify how well tumours have responded. The aim is to advance more individualised treatment and identify patients who can defer surgery (see Deferral of Surgery).

### Deferral of Surgery (Royal Marsden)

£10,000 Can surgery be avoided completely for bowel cancer patients who respond to chemo radiotherapy? A further grant has been awarded to this important study for patients whose tumour has disappeared.

### FLEX (St Mark's Hospital) £14,500

This study will assess the new FLEX surgical procedure for the removal of bowel polyps (small growths in the inner lining of the bowel). The technique combines the use of a telescope (colono-scope) and keyhole surgery to remove only a small part of the bowel containing the polyp. The aim is that patients with polyps and early bowel cancer can avoid major surgery and its consequences.

#### Mercury II (Basingstoke)

This is Pelican's on-going lead study, looking at the use of MRI for rectal cancer surgery and how patients' lives are affected by their surgery.

#### COURSE FOCUS

In 2006 we hosted the first Pelican Prostate Colloquium to discuss potential advances in prostate cancer management, in particular improved imaging and more precise treatment.

This year was our Seventh International Prostate Cancer Colloquium, held over two days, at the Royal College of Surgeons in London. These meetings promote discussion and collaboration between experts from around the world on cutting edge research and

innovations in precise prostate cancer treatment.

John Balsdon, a focal therapy patient gave an excellent talk on the dilemma that men face when deciding what treatment will suit them best. This focused the meeting on patient's benefit with particularly interesting debate between Dr Peter Pinto (urologist from the National Institute of Health in Maryland, USA) and Prof Mark Emberton (pictured left) from UCLH on alternative focal therapy treatments.

On the second day Pelican organised a radiology workshop, led by Dr Alex Kirkham and Dr Clare Allen (Consultant Radiologists at UCLH) who are pictured right. 60 radiologists and urologists examined MRI case studies of localised prostate cancer.




